I'VE BEEN TO THE MOUNTAIN TOP: Shortly before he was gunned down by an assassin in Memphis, Tennessee, Martin Luther King (1929 – 1968) told the assembled crowds, "We've got some difficult days ahead, but it doesn't matter with me now because I've been to the mountain top and I don't mind. Like anybody, I would like to live a long life. Longevity has its place, but I'm not concerned about that now. I just want to do God's will and He has allowed me to go up to the mountain. I'm happy tonight. I'm not worried about anything and I'm not fearing any man. Mine eyes have seen the glory of the coming of the Lord." It was his vision of a better future and his conviction that equal freedom would one day be enjoyed by all Americans that enabled King to have hope when death threats against him seemed to impel not only his life but the entire civil rights movement. After King's death, his experience of the mountain top inspired his followers to continue his work just as Jesus' disciples looked to the mountain top experience of Jesus' transfiguration and were strengthened to further his mission.
